INTERNATIONAL ENGLISH LANGUAGE TESTING SYSTEM (IELTS)

Syllabus & Course Structure



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Test Format

IELTS consists of four components. All candidates take the same Listening and Speaking tests. There is a choice of Reading and Writing tests according to whether a candidate is taking the Academic or General Training module

Academic	General Training
For candidates wishing to study at undergraduate or postgraduate levels, and for those seeking professional registration	For candidates wishing to migrate to an English-speaking country (Australia, Canada, New Zealand, UK), and for those wishing to train or study below degree level

Listening

- The test has four parts.
- The first two parts are about social needs and include conversations and monologues.
- The last two parts are about education or training and include conversations and monologues.
- Questions include multiple choice, matching, labeling diagrams, filling out forms, completing notes, tables, flowcharts, summaries, sentences, and short answers.
- You listen to the recording once and answer the questions as you go.
- You have ten minutes at the end to transfer your answers to an answer sheet.

- The test has three sections and 40 questions.
- You'll read three texts from different sources on general topics.
- At least one text has a detailed argument.
- Questions include multiple choice, true/false/not given, matching, completing sentences, and more.
- You need to understand the texts and answer questions based on them.

Writing

- The test has two tasks.
- Task 1 (20 minutes, at least 150 words): You describe a diagram or data in your own words, like explaining a process or an object.
- Task 2 (40 minutes, at least 250 words): You discuss a point of view, problem, or argument. You can provide solutions, justify opinions, compare evidence, and evaluate ideas.
- Task 2 is more important for your Writing score.

SPEAKING

- Part 1 (Introduction followed by an Interview) In this activity, candidates must introduce themselves in around 4-5 minutes by discussing their family, hobbies, interests, educational history, and so on.
- Part 2 (Long Turn) Candidates will be given a flashcard with a topic printed for this stage of the IELTS speaking exam. They can think for a few minutes, acquaint themselves with the issue, and speak for 2-3 minutes. Following that, the interviewer may ask some follow-up questions to assess the candidate's subject knowledge.
- Part 3 (Discussion) A thorough examination of the topic presented in Part 2 and the candidate's speech and comprehension will be thoroughly examined. Candidates will have the opportunity to go deeper into the subject and cover it in greater detail. This task usually takes about 5-6 minutes to complete.

IELTS Eligibility

IELTS does not have major conditions on its eligibility. However, there are some points which you must keep in mind.

Minimum Age	Even though there is no set age limit however it is not recommended for students below 16 years
Passport	Valid, non-expired passport.
Use / TRF Requriment	 Planning to immigrate to Australia/Canada/New Zealand/UK. Want to study in Australia/Canada/New Zealand/USA/UK and other countries. Medical professionals who plan to study or work further in Australia/UK/USA.
Minimum IELTS Score for Top Universities	The minimum score varies from one university to another.
